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Living Waters' mission is the support of Roman Catholic missionary and international development projects in East Africa.

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The Christmas Star lit the path of the wise men seeking the baby Jesus. This Christmas, 145 sponsors are shining their light on a path to education and a brighter future for children of all ages including young men studying as seminarians.

A few facts about Living Waters' student sponsorship program:

- It began in 2000 supporting the education of children from poor families in Tanzania, Kenya, Uganda and Mozambique.
- 206 students are in the program; of these almost half are now in secondary school (high school). Thanks to our amazing sponsors, the program has grown with the children because many sponsors have been providing funds since their child was at a young age.
- We serve the poorest of the poor. Many children have no parents because of AIDS and are being raised by a relative, usually a grandparent. Others have a single parent, under-employed parent(s), or agriculture families struggling through re-occurring droughts.
- The \$300 a year our sponsors send us provides for a quality education including school fees, uniforms, supplies, medical needs and meals. Perhaps most significant, sponsored students receive life orientation through Catholic Christian formation!
- Living Waters acts as the go-between between sponsors and missionaries.
- Presently we work with 27 mission sites coordinating student correspondence and distribution of funds with the priests and religious sisters.

Earlier this year my husband Brian and I had the incredible opportunity to meet some of these students on our travels in Africa. One young lady was a former sponsored student, and when she learned we were traveling in Uganda, she took the initiative

to find a way to meet. Her name was Sylvia, and she wanted us to know that she had just graduated from teacher training college. She is a beautiful young lady and when she greeted us, she had the brightest smile. Sylvia spoke emotional words of "thanks" for her sponsors, Danielle and Thomas Quinlan of Antigo, WI and Living Waters International, who gave her the chance to complete her secondary school studies and advance to the teacher training college. She is well on her way to a very bright future. I was humbled to tears seeing this young lady glow, knowing God united us all out of love for our brother and sister. *(Continued on Page 3)*

Here to Be Light

December 16, 2016, a baby girl from Kenya by the name of Goretti was born into this world with a congenital defect known as bladder exstrophy. Her bladder was protruding from the wall of her abdomen. If left untreated, it would lead to greater complications including renal failure. The darkness and intensity with which this little girl was born left her parents desperate and uncertain whether they could save their child's life. Goretti's father is deaf and mute, making it very difficult to obtain work, and her mother had to quit her teaching job because of the round the clock care she needed. They began to reach out to relatives, fellow villagers and anyone else that could help with the expenses incurred by her day to day needs and surgeries that would follow.

Living Waters International is also reaching out. We were able to help with proceeds from summer fundraisers along with support from personal donations, Catholic Financial Life and St. James Choir of Cooperstown. Collectively, \$4,810 was realized.

After her first surgery and in a letter to Living Waters, Goretti's aunt, Sister Feliciana Njagi, Missionary Sisters of the Precious Blood said, "Up until her first surgery, she spent most of her life crying." Now, in this Advent season of mounting light we're told, "That smile from her little face tells you that you have caused a miracle in her life and in our entire family. I can only say 'THANK YOU' and implore Gods blessings on your lives. I am very grateful, and I pray that God in his generosity will reward you from the abundance of his heart. He has the right and greatest reward for the kind people that you are."

Unlike the United States, a high school education is not a right for many African youth. Getting into a good secondary school is difficult because the obstacles they face are huge. They have to successfully pass the National Examination at the end of grade school. Failure means dropping out or attending an overcrowded government school with little resources. Women at this age are particularly challenged because they struggle with cultural practices, which encourage marriage or pregnancy much too early.

Sylvia beat the odds. Sylvia has eight siblings and her father did not have steady work. Her tuition fees and boarding would not have been possible without a helping hand. "Sylvia's faith and determination in achieving her goals has been a source of inspiration for Tom and I. We are grateful to have been a part of her life." Danielle and Tom Quinlan.

There's a saying, "One thing leads to another, everything is connected." In December of 2004, Bob and Jo Lomprey picked Aldo from a list of several students awaiting sponsorship. Jo said, "I chose Aldo because one of my favorite books, *A Sand County Almanac*, is authored by a man who shares the same first name, Aldo Leopold." The book's subject matter: ecology and environmentalism. Fast forward thirteen years and Aldo has graduated as an Agriculture Technician from the Institute of Agriculture in Salamanga, Mozambique.

As it happens, Aldo is from a district where most of the people earn their livelihood from agricultural products and animal rearing. Aldo chose agriculture to help improve on the unsystematic and primitive ways of production in his country. "I joined this course to learn more about farming and animals and to teach my people by bringing new development in society." Aldo has applied for work with various companies and is eagerly awaiting a call for that one interview that will land him a job in his field. Meanwhile, he is staying with his grandmother and doing some daily jobs in construction.

Despite being continents apart and a language barrier, Bob and Jo have enjoyed their connection with Aldo over the
