Trip confirms sacrifices here; enable the Church in Africa

In 2016 LWI directed \$715,000 to multiple Catholic religious communities in nine countries in support of 70 different programs, including the student sponsorship program, which provides for the care and education of 240 needy children. The money is made possible through the generosity of hundreds of benefactors of LWI. While the money is freely given, LWI recognizes it comes as the result of the financial sacrifices of many. Whether you are supporting a needy student or helping with a clean water project, LWI is sincerely appreciative to everyone who funds our initiatives. Be assured you are making a difference -- 97% of LWI's overall revenue is spent on missionary programs assisting the poor.

Promoting LWI's initiatives and then directing the money to the proper places in Africa is no small task. On a daily basis, someone from LWI's board of directors is in contact with African missionaries through email or other social media. While electronic communication works, it doesn't allow us to experience what's happening on the ground in Africa. As a result, some of the directors try to save money so they can get to Africa on a rotating basis every 4-5 years. This past February, my wife Karen and I made our third trip and this time our long-time friend and supporter of LWI, George Shinners, traveled with us to Uganda, Kenya, and Tanzania. The trip lasted 17 days and was full – we visited 30 different sites and met with scores of missionaries. Here are some of the highlights:

Meeting students – Karen coordinates the student program and prior to our arrival arranged with the various sites to visit as many of the sponsored children as possible. Her organization bore fruit – we were blessed with the opportunity to meet one-on-one with 70 children. These meetings were heartwarming and reinvigorated our efforts to help the poorest of the poor. The children are all so grateful for their sponsors giving them the op-

portunity of a good education! If you are a sponsor of a student, know that your sacrifice in supporting your child is giving them the precious gift of a better life!

Dedicating new schools – This trip provided us the opportunity to celebrate two school's openings. The first was St. Francis de Sales College, a new secondary school in Iyolwa Uganda. Because of generous benefactors LWI was able to provide funds for school furniture, the science lab, and text books thank Notre Dame Academy in Green Bay. This co-ed school is located in a rural area that has been severely impacted by civil war. **(continued on page 2)**

It is the only high school in this part of country and many of the 200 students come from poor families or are orphans. The students live in dormitories on campus, and for many they are the first in their families to attend high school. The second school opening celebration was in Katani Kenya where we cut the ribbon on a



new pre-k and kindergarten facility. Through a generous contribution of a benefactor, LWI was able to pay a substantial part of the construction costs of the school.

Visiting seminarians – All told we met nearly 80 young men who were in various stages of becoming a priest. Most were met during visits to the Lumen Christi Institute and the Fransalian House in Tanzania. At the Fransalian House we were privileged to witness the Final Vows of six Missionary of St. Francis de Sales seminarians, two of which are being supported by LWI under our Seminarian Purse program. If you are a sponsor of a seminarian, know that they too are grateful for the sacrifice you are making so they can become a priest!

Witnessing healing – During our travels we visited three medical clinics and one hospital, all of which are being run by religious sister congregations. All offer medical services to the poor with a special emphasis for mothers and children. These visits were so inspiring because of the extraordinary medical service provided by the sisters with genuine love and concern for all. The hours they put in under difficult conditions are beyond belief, but somehow, they manage to do it with a joyous heart.

Growing churches –The progress made since our first visit in 2004 in getting parishes established is remarkable. We toured a number of new churches where LWI provided some assistance. At one site, which we first visited in 2004 where mass was celebrated in a structure resembling a large chicken coop, now there is an

extraordinary beautiful church, which seats over 1000 and is full at all four weekend services.

George Shinners of Antigo, WI, friend and benefactor of Living Waters.

Having just returned from 15 days in East Africa with Karen and Brian Prunty visiting schools, health clinics and religious formation centers supported by Living Waters International, I have many vibrant memories of our visits with the priests, sisters and students we met in Uganda, Kenya and Tanzania.

While each visit was unique, there seemed to be something similar in all of them. I now realize that it was the presence. the dedication. the hard-earned progress shepherded by the Fransalian priests and brothers at each of these facilities. There are now many more priests than when Jane and I first visited Molongo, Kenya in 2001, but many more are still needed. The outlying parish missions

and schools, both new and expanding, all need priests to provide wise guidance for them to prosper and carry on the evangelization and education programs of the Fransalians and their many colleagues.

This need for priests reminded me of our visit to Tabora, Tanzania in 2009, in which Jane and I participated in the ordination of Father Zachariah Burofero, the first native Tanzanian to be ordained a priest in the MSFS order. Father Zac was the first seminarian we had the privilege of supporting financially. Recently, I had the pleasure of meeting our second seminarian, now Father Thomas Njeru, who was ordained in October 2016 at the MSFS Provincial House in Morogoro, Tanzania. We also attended the Profession of Final Vows by six MSFS seminarians. This joyous ceremony was especially meaningful to me because I was able to meet Brother Patrick Musyimi, one of the six, who we will continue to support as he progresses to his ordination in two years.

When I think about the truly amazing work the Fathers have accomplished and see the many projects, which are either underway or in the planning stage, I realize what a privilege it is to be able to financially support the seminarians who soon will be able to help carry this much needed, and appreciated, work forward.
